THERE IS A STRONG INTEREST and considerable experience among CSPS members in providing humanitarian medical care and plastic surgeons have long been involved in overseas surgical missions. Operation Smile, Operation Rainbow, and many other plastic surgery organizations provide much needed plastic surgical care for cleft lip and palate, burns and other pathologies.

I was attracted to Doctors without Borders/Médecins sans

With Médecins sans frontières in the Democratic Republic of the Congo

Frontières, an association of medical and non-medical personnel established in 1971 in Paris. MSF provides medical care to populations in distress, to victims of natural and man-made disasters and to victims of armed conflict. They do so irrespective of race, religion, creed or political convictions, while observing strict neutrality and impartiality in the name of universal medical ethics and the right to humanitarian assistance. Members undertake to respect their professional code of ethics and to maintain complete independence from all political, economic, or religious powers. In addition to providing medical care, MSF's other

main raison d'être is to bear witness. In 1999, MSF received the Nobel Peace Prize for its work. Currently MSF operates in 70 countries worldwide and has 30+ thousand employees of whom under 10% are internationals. At any point in time, MSF Canada has approximately 175-200 Canadians in the field, 2/3 of whom are non-medical and half of whom come from Quebec.

I recently returned from a 6-week mission in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, specifically in the northeastern province of North-Kivu

Report from the President 2016-2017

BIA-ALCL

This continues to be an important issue facing plastic surgeons and our patients. I have been the Canadian representative to the Global ALCL network, which has worked to collect data and provide the most up to date information for members. I will continue in this role.

CSPS and CSAPS have worked collaboratively to distribute information to our members as it has become available from outside sources, including ASPS and ASAPS as well as other international societies.

I have had significant interaction with Health Canada, both written and in the form of conference calls. They are in the process of trying to bring themselves up to speed on this issue, and collaboration with HC will be important in the future.

I believe that this will become an increasingly important issue facing plastic surgeons and our patients, and that the CSPS should continue to have a strong presence in educating our members and patients.

Website Re Design

The new website is complete and functional, and has a much more modern look. There continue to be small issues that have been resolved over the past year. The Board has also worked over the last year to consider whether the Society should have a social media presence, and if so, what the scope of that should be. This will be further discussed and a plan developed for the future at the Fall Board meeting.

President's Medal

The President's Medal this year will be awarded to Dr. **Doug Ross** for his leadership in academic plastic surgery. Dr. Ross has served as the Chief of Plastic Surgery at the University of Western Ontario for many years, as an examiner and Chief Examiner for the Royal College, and is the current chair of the Specialty Committee in Plastic Surgery. He has also a past President of the CSPS. He has demonstrated a commitment to Canadian plastic surgery that is worthy of this recognition.

In memoriam




Dr. Reid Waters August 4, 2017

Dr. Reid Waters graduated from Campion College in Regina and was then accepted into micro-biology at McGill University where he entered Medicine after only two years of the undergraduate program. Following his graduation in 1955, Dr. Waters completed his general

surgery and plastic surgery residencies at McGill. In 1962, he moved to Winnipeg to start his practice at the Winnipeg Clinic. In 1964, he helped establish a plastic surgery residency program in Winnipeg. He was an associate professor at the University of Manitoba's Faculty of Medicine for many years and became Chief of Plastic Surgery later in his career. In 1976, he was one of three Canadian plastic surgeons invited by the Chinese government to share the latest in burns care management and microsurgery. In 1974, Reid Waters established his practice at Plastic Surgery Associates. Reid spearheaded the opening of Manitoba's first Surgery Centre for cosmetic and dental surgery, the Western Surgery Centre in 1985. He served as Head of Surgery at the Misericordia Hospital in the 1990s. He was very involved in the Canadian Society of Plastic Surgeons and in 1981, served as its president. He was also active as Chair of the Ethics Council with the American Society of Plastic Surgeons. Reid was deeply interested in continuing medical education and was one of the primary crusaders for the development of an educational foundation for the Canadian Society of Plastic Surgeons as well as inviting professors from all over the world to lecture annually to the Plastic Surgery residents in Winnipeg. He was a strong advocate for the best medical care, pioneered many groundbreaking surgeries and profoundly changed the lives of numerous patients. In 2007, Dr. Waters was awarded a lifetime achievement award from the Canadian Society of Plastic Surgeons, an honour for his outstanding contribution to the profession of plastic surgery.

In memoriam



Dr. James Ross August 31, 2016

Dr. Ross began his university education at UNB but was interrupted by World War 2 when he shifted gears to train as a para-trooper, receiving the rank of Company Sergeant Major. Just as his troop, the 1st Canadian Parachute Brigade was to be deployed, the war

ended and he returned to university. He graduated from Dalhousie University Medical School in 1951. Following postgraduate training in Halifax and Toronto, he continued his studies as a travelling fellow in England and Europe. He became the first qualified plastic surgeon in the Maritime Provinces, beginning his practice in 1959. Dr. Ross was instrumental in the creation of the first two burn units in the Maritime Provinces. He specialized in the treatment of accident victims, cleft lip and palate reconstructions and burn treatments. He established the foundations of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery at Dalhousie in 1972. He was the author of numerous medical articles and served as President of the Canadian Society of Plastic Surgeons in 1982. He was committed to encouraging and supporting students in their medical studies and created a nursing scholarship at UNB in his mother's name. His surgical skills were internationally renowned. Jim was hosted by the Czech government, to thank him for his dedication and medical attention entrusted to plane crash patients of the Czech crash that occurred in Gander in 1967. In 1976. Dr. Ross and three of his colleagues were invited by the Chinese Plastic Surgeon's Association to share medical knowledge and procedures. This information was invaluable at the time and augmented medical techniques in Canada tremendously.

near the borders with Rwanda, Uganda and Burundi. This area has seen almost nonstop conflict since independence in 1960, much originating in geopolitical and local issues related to colonization, independence, language, natural resources, corporate greed and world politics. Since 1960, in the Congo, millions of people have perished through armed conflict, civil strife and medical issues such as malnutrition, infectious diseases and the absence of medical care.

I worked with several other surgeons in a small district hospital providing surgical care in the broadest sense of the word. We worked on a one-in-three call schedule and were responsible for ward duties, the emergency room and the OR's. In 6 weeks of work, I performed around 400 operative cases. The case mix included specific plastic surgery care like wound debridements, skin grafting for burns, infectious disease surgery, such as for soft tissue infections and osteomyelitis, and fracture care, including facial, hand and long bone fractures. In addition to those cases, we also took care of bowel obstructions and perforations, incarcerated hernias, inguinal hernias, pediatric surgery, gynecological and obstetrical emergencies and others. On a daily basis, we saw patients with gunshot wounds.

Surgery was done under comparatively primitive circumstances, sometimes without lights, with only marginal anesthesia, with few instruments, often not even a cautery and without modern techniques such as internal fixation or instruments such as staplers for bowel anastomoses. It was an eye-opening experience, with so many seemingly preventable deaths occurring, but also very gratifying when one could save a life.

It is hard to imagine that, in fact, the overwhelming majority of people on this earth have access to only a fraction of the medical care that we consider completely normal here in Canada. In the Congo, the average person lives on less than one dollar a day and more than 150 out of every 1000 children die before the age of 5. Canadian surgeons, including plastic surgeons, can contribute tremendously to alleviate suffering in many places. In the words of James Orbinski, a past Canadian president of MSF in his memoire An Imperfect Offering: Humanitarianism is about more than medical efficiency or technical competence. In its first moment, in its sacred present, humanitarianism seeks to relieve the immediacy of suffering, and most especially of suffering alone.

Working for less fortunate people is very rewarding and can be done here in Canada, as in locations like the inner cities or in the North, or elsewhere in the world in poorer countries or countries ravaged by war and political turmoil.

Another initiative includes disseminating information about the disease to family physicians to increase awareness and educate primary care providers. CSPS 2018 Lifetime Achievement Award

The twelfth annual CSPS Lifetime Achievement Award was given to Dr. Nancy McKee (Toronto) It was presented at the President's dinner during the Society's 71st Annual Meeting in Winnipeg.

Nominations for the 2018 Award will be accepted until February 1, 2018 In addition, nominees previously proposed will be carried over for consideration.

Description of the Award

Purpose

This award honors an established plastic surgeon who is a member of the Canadian Society of Plastic Surgeons and has made an outstanding contribution to the profession and to the CSPS.

The award will be made on the basis of teaching, research, innovation and service to the community or other endeavors.

Nominees for this annual award will be reviewed by the CSPS Nominating Committee.

Eligibility

Members in good standing of the CSPS for at least 20 years are eligible.

The Award

The Award consists of the waiver of registration fees for the Annual Meeting in the year in which the award is bestowed and a plaque given at the annual President's Banquet.

 $Nomination\ Procedure$

The complete nomination consists of a letter from a member of the CSPS formally proposing the nominee and outlining the nominee's specific contributions to plastic surgery and to the Society accompanied by the nominee's curriculum vitae.

In memoriam



Dr. Robert Harris July 19, 2017

DR. ROBERT HARRIS completed his medical studies at the University of British Columbia in 1957, then went East for postgraduate training in the McGill University teaching hospital system. He did experimental surgery and earned a M.Sc. degree.

His clinical formation was in the specialty of plastic and reconstructive surgery, and he went on to a fellowship in surgery of the hand in Great Britain, France, and Switzerland. He subsequently took the examinations for his Royal College of Surgeons (Canada) fellowship standing. From his research work and clinical trials, Dr. Harris published more than 20 scientific journal articles and textbook chapters. His 45 years of clinical practice were divided between three Montréal teaching hospitals, Hôpital Saint-Luc, the Montréal General Hospital, and St. Mary's Hospital where he was Chief of Plastic Surgery, and two Cornwall community hospitals. He was determined to communicate with his francophone patients in their own language and became fluent in French. Dr. Harris became the first full-time plastic and reconstructive surgeon in the Seaway community. He developed the outpatient clinic concept with Dr. R.D. Tombler, orthopedist, at the Hôtel Dieu Hospital in Cornwall and cultivated the practice of outpatient surgery, especially applicable to skin cancer patients. In addition to clinical practice, Dr. Harris pursued his interests in surgical research and pioneered an electrophysiological technique for distinguishing sensory and motor fibres in peripheral nerve repair. He was a founding member of the Canadian Society for Surgery of the Hand (Manus Canada) and a member of the American Hand Surgery Association. He was elected to the active membership of the distinguished American Society for Surgery of the Hand after presenting and publishing original work on rheumatoid arthritis of the hands.

The respect and admiration was mutual and in a gesture of reciprocity, Canada has been invited to participate as the guest nation for the annual meeting of the Korean Society of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeons scheduled for November 10-12, 2018. The meeting is the largest plastic surgery gathering in Asia with more than 1,500 regional and 300 international surgeons participating. I have personally attended scientific meetings in Seoul and can attest to their quality and academic merit. This is a wonderful opportunity for any members who have a desire to visit this vibrant, modern and culturally diverse megalopolis.

Mid-Atlantic nations meeting

Our society was invited to participate in initial planning to explore the feasibility of convening a joint meeting of Mid-Atlantic nations including several Nordic countries, North America, and the UK. The impetus for a collective meeting between the Mid-Atlantic countries is to foster increased collaboration between their respective plastic surgery societies. The meeting is not necessarily intended to replace national society annual meetings, but might in some instances. In late August a conference call was moderated by Dr. Jeff Janis, presidentelect of ASPS, with participation by Canada, Sweden, Norway, Finland, and the UK. The inaugural meeting proposed for mid-June 2020 is to be 2.5-3 days, covering all aspects of plastic surgery with a target audience of plastic surgeons, residents and nursing personnel. An Organizing Committee with representatives from each participating country will be formed for all planning, decision making and division of workload.
